## ENACT A MINIMUN WAGE THAT IS A LIVING WAGE

\*During the 1930s depression President Roosevelt declared "No business which depends for existence on paying less then living wages to its workers has any right to continue in this country".

\*Due in part to the considerable increase in low wage jobs, working-age people for the first time now make up the majority in U.S. households that rely on food stamps. The minimum wage would increase purchasing power, which would stimulate the economy and reduce unemployment.

\*The Berkeley City Council will be asked to consider a minimum wage proposal that would begin with near \$11 an hour and would continually rise annually to a living wage level. In addition, employees would receive a medical benefit of \$2.22 an hour. \*California's minimum wage will increase to only \$10 an hour in two years. It doesn't even include a cost of living adjustment each year.

\*Landlords who own rent controlled apartments in Berkeley receive an annual cost of living adjustment. So why shouldn't working people!

\*Even if the entire cost of the wage increase is passed on to consumers, the impact would be minimal. The cost of grocery shopping would increase on the average to less than \$20 a year.
