

Building Power

There are still many who believe that we lack the money to fund and improve our vital social and economic programs. But consider the following --Social Security benefits can be substantially increased by raising the taxable limit of \$117,000. In short, the extraordinary economic inequality in our society reflects the extraordinary political inequality in our society. How, then, can the 99% prevail over the 1%? We certainly outnumber them.

We are constantly waging political battles. But to stand a chance of winning the war we must always ask the question "How in the course of the many struggles we wage, are we building power?" To do so it is not enough to achieve our specific end. The particular means we adopt are crucial. We must ask no matter what the outcome is whether we attracting more participants Very critical, are we bringing more people out in the streets. Only then will Congress really listen to us. Lobbying and internet activism is not enough. Most important, are we operating democratically. Democratic participation is not only a virtue onto itself. Democratic participation also builds leadership and encourages activists to develop their skills and self-confidence. And in the process the vocabulary changes from "I" to "We". Please keep in mind the very wise words of Mahatma Gandhi "You must be the change you wish to see in
